








In 2002, my best friend Lucy was cast as Sue in the LDS's studio production of A Slice of Saturday Night. I remember watching this witty show unravel and remember being captivated by all the characters and the songs. Lucy excitedly called me in 2004 and told me that the LDS planned to revive their production of 'Slice' on their main stage. My first question was, "Who is playing Rick...?" Unfortunately for me, all of the original male cast reprised their roles. Again, I sat watching this incredible show and made a pact with myself that one day I would be involved in this show.

Last year, I discovered a gem of a venue at 'Upstairs at the Western' (Leicester's first pub theatre) – an intimate, original space that is perfect for new theatre companies starting out. As I sat in the audience watching a play there, I had a light bulb moment... "I have to do 'Slice' at this venue". It had always been a dream of mine to have my own theatre company and produce all the small scale musicals that other societies do not. In September 2014, we spent six incredible nights presenting

'Slice' at Upstairs at the Western. Not only did I act out my long ambition of playing Rick, but we also played to packed audiences and made memories none of us will ever forget.

It is an honour to bring this show back to the Little Theatre main stage in conjunction with the Leicester Drama Society. Yes we have three new cast members. a much larger space to fill and an incredible set to play on – but the show you see tonight still has the heart, essence and style of our original production presented at Upstairs at the Western. This show would not be possible without the tireless efforts of my good friend Leigh White - Director / Musical Director whose ideas and visions bring this show to life for you

It has been a very long walk back to the LDS stage... but worth every moment.

WHY MUST I Be a Teenager in Love?

By the late 1950s a new generation was coming of age and, instead of moving seamlessly from childhood to adulthood, there was a whole new rite of passage - the teenager had arrived. Britain had come through the war and a time of great austerity and now a new generation had spare time and, more importantly, spare cash coupled with a totally different outlook on life from their elders. The world was moving on in many ways, and nowhere more explosively than in the world of music.

There were still the popular vocalists of the immediate post-war period such as Frank Sinatra, Rosemary Clooney and our own Alma Cogan, but suddenly there was rock'n'roll. Coming initially from America with the likes of Bill Haley and His Comets, Little Richard and Elvis Presley, soon here in Britain we began to create our own rock'n'roll and emulate the young pretty boy singers like Rick Nelson with Tommy Steele, Billy Fury and Cliff Richard.

The combination of two guitars, bass and drums became the leading model for the group sound of the 1960s and the list of greats who got together at this time is seemingly endless: The Beatles, The Rolling Stones, The Kinks, The Who, The Searchers and Billy J Kramer and his Dakotas.

Teenagers felt they owned the music. Bob Dylan's lyrics spoke to them. They could hear him on a jukebox, in a club, on a Dansette record player, and perhaps if they lived in the right place, they could get continuous music from the new pirate radio stations, Luxembourg and Caroline. Not only that... This new music was becoming increasingly 'popular'. Television helped here with the advent of shows like Juke Box Jury, Ready, Steady, Go!, Oh Boy! and, in 1963, Top of the Pops. Even if you couldn't get to a live concert of your favourite group, you could see them perform live on telly. And you could see them at the cinema too. Although the period saw a huge downturn in cinemagoing, mainly because of the growth of television, big star names could always draw the teenage audiences: Elvis made a whole bunch of films and in 1964 came the Beatles' first, A Hard Day's Night.

It seemed as if there were suddenly no barriers of age or class stopping you enjoying the new lifestyle.

Pop music had taken its place in the vanguard of popular culture. Song lyrics still covered the age-old subjects of love, loss and attitude, but it was the younger generation who were both writing and performing the songs - pop music had become the very barometer of culture.

The Sixties were about to swing.
